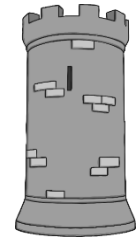


Year 1 Home Learning

This term our topic is Castles and Dragons



Parents/carers please can you look at and read to your child the story '**Knights and Dragons Unite**' on the PowerPoint and talk with them about castles, dragons, knights. Would your child like to be a king/queen/knight/dragon?

Reading	<p>Keep reading! If you do not have any books to read at home, you could visit Oxford Owl; they have lots of online books for you to read. https://home.oxfordowl.co.uk/reading/free-ebooks/</p> <p>If the only books you have at home are trickier than your usual books, you could do some shared reading with your grown up. You could read the words that you recognise and your grown up could read the trickier ones. Alternatively, you could listen to your grown up read a sentence and then you 'echo' read it back to them, see if you can follow the words with your finger as both of you read.</p> <p>If you have books at home that are easier than you usually read, it is still useful to read them. Your grown up could challenge you to read them with lots of expression. Can you close the book and retell the story to your grown up? How much detail can you remember?</p> <p>We have also saved a reading comprehension sheet to the Home Learning section of the school website. Your grown up can read it to you while you listen really carefully to see if you can answer the questions at the end.</p> <p>Have you got any books with castle or dragon stories or information in?</p>
Writing	<p>Tell your adult what you know about castles and about dragons. Write some sentences about what you already know. Add another sentence about what you would like to learn about castles and dragons.</p> <p>Read each sentence once you have written it, and of course, check that you have included a capital letter and a full stop.</p> <p>Parents / carers - if you feel your child will find writing a number of whole sentences too tricky, feel free to write the beginning part of their sentences, letting them complete the end. The important thing is that they form the sentences verbally <u>first</u> and that they have a go at sounding out some of the words for themselves to build their skills.</p>

Adjectives are describing words. They tell us more about a person or a place.

Read and discuss the following adjectives with your grown up. Which adjectives describe Aristar the Dragon from the story 'Knights and Dragons Unite'?

Have a go at drawing or painting a dragon from your own imagination. Talk to a grown up about your picture. What does your dragon look like? How does your dragon behave?

Can you write some adjectives around your picture to describe your very own dragon? You could borrow some adjectives from the list above or think of some new ones.

Maths	<p>Wednesday</p> <p>In the last few weeks of term we were learning about number bonds to numbers within 10. Now we would like you to try to compare number bonds with each other. You will be deciding whether a number bond is greater than, less than or equal to the another. Watch the 'Compare number bonds' video on https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/year-1/week-6-number-addition-subtraction/.</p> <p>Be like Have A Go Holly and try the questions on Wednesday's worksheet and then if you are feeling like Ivy, try her true false questions underneath. If it helps you to count, then please use Lego pieces, cubes or anything else you might have at home while you are working on the questions.</p> <p>Thursday</p> <p>If you need to, watch the video from yesterday again to remind yourself of how to compare number bonds.</p> <p>With a family member take it in turns to role two dice and use the numbers they land on to create two number sentences (just like the characters in the White Rose video). Then create a greater than, less than or equal sign between your number sentences using two pencils or two lolly sticks. Then repeat.</p> <p>Friday</p> <p>Today let's think about adding two parts together to make a whole.</p> <p>Watch the video called 'Addition - adding together' on the following link https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/year-1/week-7-number-addition-subtraction/</p>

	<p>Then on the sheet have a go at the ‘Holly’ questions and if you are feeling like a challenge try Ivy’s questions on the last page. You may need your grown up to help you read the wording of the questions.</p> <p>If you are looking for more maths, try this website for maths games:</p> <p>http://www.ictgames.com/mobilePage/index.html</p> <p>Or choose a number between 5 and 10 and see if you can write all the number bonds for that number. You could do this for a different number each day. What happens as the numbers get bigger, are there more number bonds for larger numbers or less? Can you explain why?</p>
Music	<p>Enjoy listening to a range of music. Dance, sing along, clap your hands and see if you can use your body to find a steady beat or pulse. The following website includes songs and musical activities inspired by traditional tales from around the world. Have a go at learning to sing ‘Tiddalik the Frog’ along with Rebecca and Andy. RE	<p>Let’s think about how to show friendship. Watch <i>Say Hello</i> on the following link https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=1IF-QUuloNc</p> <p>Cut up the statements at the top of the friendship sheet provided and stick them into the sections shown on the sheet depending on whether you think they are something a good friend does or does not do.</p> <p>Can you write one sentence describing something a good friend might do and draw a picture?</p>
Art	<p>Knights defend themselves with a shield. Can you make a shield from some cardboard, a cereal box or something bigger. On the shield would be the coat of arms. This tells you something about the family. What could you put on your coat of arms? The pictures may include your initials, a picture of your house, something you like to do, your pets or anything else that makes you special. Use some other pieces of card to make loops to fix to the back to wear it on your arm. You could use glue or tape.</p>
PE	<p>Try some of these websites to keep active any time of the day.
