The voucher entitles you to £1 off the purchase of any book at the book fair. There will also be 'pocket money' items available to buy. The school benefits hugely from the commission generated by these sales (we get 60% off on all sales). At the last book sale this resulted in £617.56 worth of 'free' books to the school. LOOK what we're LEARNING!

Foundation Stage

We have had a busy half-term learning about our planet Earth's Polar Regions. We learnt about the different animals and their habitats. Lars from the story *The Little Polar Bear* ended up floating all the way to the jungle. We sorted animals into groups, those that live in the jungle and those that live in the polar regions. We enjoyed watching some nature clips about Emperor Penguins, Narwhals, whales and other polar animals. The children were full of ideas of how we could rescue Lars from the ice (Jelly Baby in an ice cube!) and then ate him! We are delighted that both Ash and Willow Classes have been recognised for their excellent behaviour and manners when moving around the school, lining up after breacktimes and in when attending assembly. They have both been awarded the Goldie Class of the Week trophy, we are so proud of them!



Year 1

What an exciting half-term of learning we have enjoyed in Year 1. On returning to school after Christmas, the children received a letter asking for help to redesign a ruined castle. We excitedly accepted the challenge but recognised we would need to become castle experts first! Through reading stories, looking at paintings, photographs and non-fiction texts, we have learnt all about the different features of a castle, why castles were built and the different roles of those who once lived in a castle. We were even lucky enough to visit a real castle owned by King Charles. Our visit to Windsor Castle was the highlight of the half-term for many of us, photos on the website. Yesterday, we celebrated our castle learning adventure by making sandwiches, adorning our crowns and enjoying a class banquet. In science we have been learning about seasonal change and how this affects the weather, plants, and animals around us. The best way to learn about the seasons is to get outside, and we have enjoyed putting on our warm coats and taking winter walks around our school grounds. We have been measuring the outside temperature and rainfall and have been looking very closely at our school trees and plant life. Signs of the coming spring are everywhere. We have noticed that our beautiful camellia is full of buds and the bulbs that we planted in the autumn are growing in abundance.

In maths we have been learning to recognise, sort and discuss the features of 2D and 3D shape and we are currently exploring place value to 20. The children are becoming very confident at using a range of manipulatives to build numbers up to 20 and are able to recognise how many tens and how many ones are in each teen number.



Year 2

Year 2 have spent an enjoyable few weeks touring the country of Kenya. We have found out lots of information about this diverse and interesting country. As Geographers we have studied the location, climate, topography and landscapes, carrying out lots of map work using a compass. We found out about the Big Five animals and collected data which we presented in a spreadsheet. In Art, we looked at masks from different African nations, learning about the customs and traditions around wearing them. We then use the technique of cardboard relief to make our own masks which look amazing. In English we read the story of Lila and the Secret of Rain which is rich in descriptive language. We collected our own 'Wow' words and wrote setting and character descriptions. We have also been working hard on our handwriting, learning more joins and trying to ensure our writing is consistent in size. In Maths, we have learnt various addition and subtraction strategies and looked at different types of questions, identifying key words so we know which calculation to carry out. Finally in Science we learnt about what living things need to survive. To finish the topic, we enjoyed a day with Kwame from African Activities and worked in small groups to make information books to share with Year 1. A fantastic half term's learning—well done Year 2!

Science and Maths Event


26th February - 28th February

Using the internet safely and positively is a key message that we promote at Oaklands Infant School, and celebrating Safer Internet Day is always a great opportunity for us to re-emphasise the online safety messages we deliver throughout the year.

The theme for this year's Safer Internet Day was "Inspiring change? Making a difference, managing influence and navigating change online"

Here at Oaklands Infant School we got involved by sharing and discussing stories aimed at helping us to understand how to keep safe online and how to make the internet better.

We would be delighted if you could join us in celebrating the day by continuing the conversation at home.

To help you with this, some top tips suggested by the UK Safer Internet Centre are shared below.

Top Tips parents and carers of under 7s

These top tips have been written for you (parents and carers) to share, and talk about, with your children. It's never too early to talk about life online!

Inspire change by spending time online together

As your child starts to spend more time online and on devices, there will be opportunities for them to interact with others, make decisions and see a wide variety of content. Spending time with your child online together is an important part of them learning how they should behave and what to do if they are ever worried, upset or unsure about something on the internet.

Make a difference by having regular discussions about the online world

As your child learns about the internet, they will likely have lots of thoughts and questions. Having regular discussions with your child gives them opportunities to tell you about the things they like doing online, as well as any concerns and worries they may have. A great time to have these conversations is whilst you are spending time online as a family.

Manage influence by being aware of the different things which engage your child online

Your child might be influenced by a range of different things when online, such as exciting adverts, their favourite characters, and even by their friends. Not all influence online is negative, but it is important to be aware of what is engaging your child online and the impact this could have on them as they get older. Balance online influences with your own and your child's thoughts by talking about what they see and hear.

Navigate change by having a clear picture of your child's developing interests

As your child grows up, their interests and hobbies will constantly change, and the things they are doing online are no different. Something they liked yesterday may be something they've lost interest in today. It is important to be curious and stay up to date with the games, apps and sites they are using and the safety settings available, so that you can help keep them safe as they start to explore the online world more.
